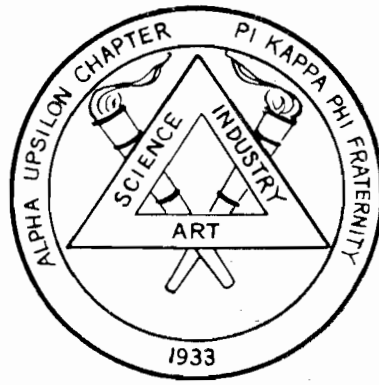

Mr. Webster has used other choice words to give a synonymous meaning to "benefit" and "brotherhood." He defines the former as anything "contributing to the improvement of a condition," and the latter as "a bond between brothers" or "an association of men united in a common interest, work or creed." These definitions can be boiled down into a few simple words: an improvement in the bond or common interest of a fraternity.

Undoubtedly, these meanings imply joint, mutual and cooperative efforts of those concerned. One man cannot, by his efforts alone, make an improvement in the bond or common interest of a fraternity. This is true not only in athletic achievements, but in scholarship, Kano, and most of all, in such a gigantic production as our Show. This fact must be known by all brothers and inculcated into the minds of all pledges.

It should be obvious to each

brother, then, that unless an attempt is made to do his best in all phases of fraternity life, an improvement in the fraternity will not occur. Therefore, whenever an improvement cannot be seen, someone is shirking his responsibility to his fraternity and to himself. Then you say, "Just wait one moment, how can you expect me to do all of those things well?" I'll tell you how you can and why you must! Each one of you has progressed through life to a point where you are expected to do all of these things well. Fraternity men, such as you, are mature, responsible and intelligent. You are one person in a group of individuals who will lead future generations. The opportunity has been offered to you, the important thing is—Do you wish to accept it? If you don't, stop reading the jokes. If you do, then utilize your varied and plentiful abilities to your fraternity.

But, then you say, "Just wait one moment. You're telling me to improve myself so that I can contribute more to the fraternity. I thought you were going to tell me how I can, as a fraternity man, benefit most from brotherhood." The funny part of this answer is that only by contributing and participating in the joint and cooperative efforts of a fraternity can you benefit from brotherhood. A social budget and a social schedule do not make a socially successful term. Only through the efforts of all brothers in preparing the schedule, properly utilizing the funds and in participating in the function can it ever be judged a success. And when it is, the efforts of all brothers will be cited as the primary factor in improving the bond between fraternity men.

So, by "putting out" a lot more effort, you, individually, can help your fraternity. In return, and this is what you are interested in, the fraternity will give you an added amount of: maturity, responsibility, leadership, self-assurance, a keener more creative mind and pride in Pi Kappa Phi Fraternity. Unfortunately, the fraternity can give you no more than you give it and only to those who contribute both sincerely and unselfishly.

The sandbaggers on field day, the non-participating brothers, and the glory-hounds who selfishly use their talents for personal acclaim, will someday realize what important facets of their developments they passed by. They will be worse off because of it and, unfortunately, realize that fact.

With fall term drawing to a close I pause to reflect on the events of the last few months, and turn to ponder the future. It's a tribute to the brothers of Pi Kappa Phi that we've been successful in winning the I.F. So my answer to you is this—improve yourself and do your best in as many facets of the fraternity as you can; and in this way, you will be able to benefit most from brotherhood.

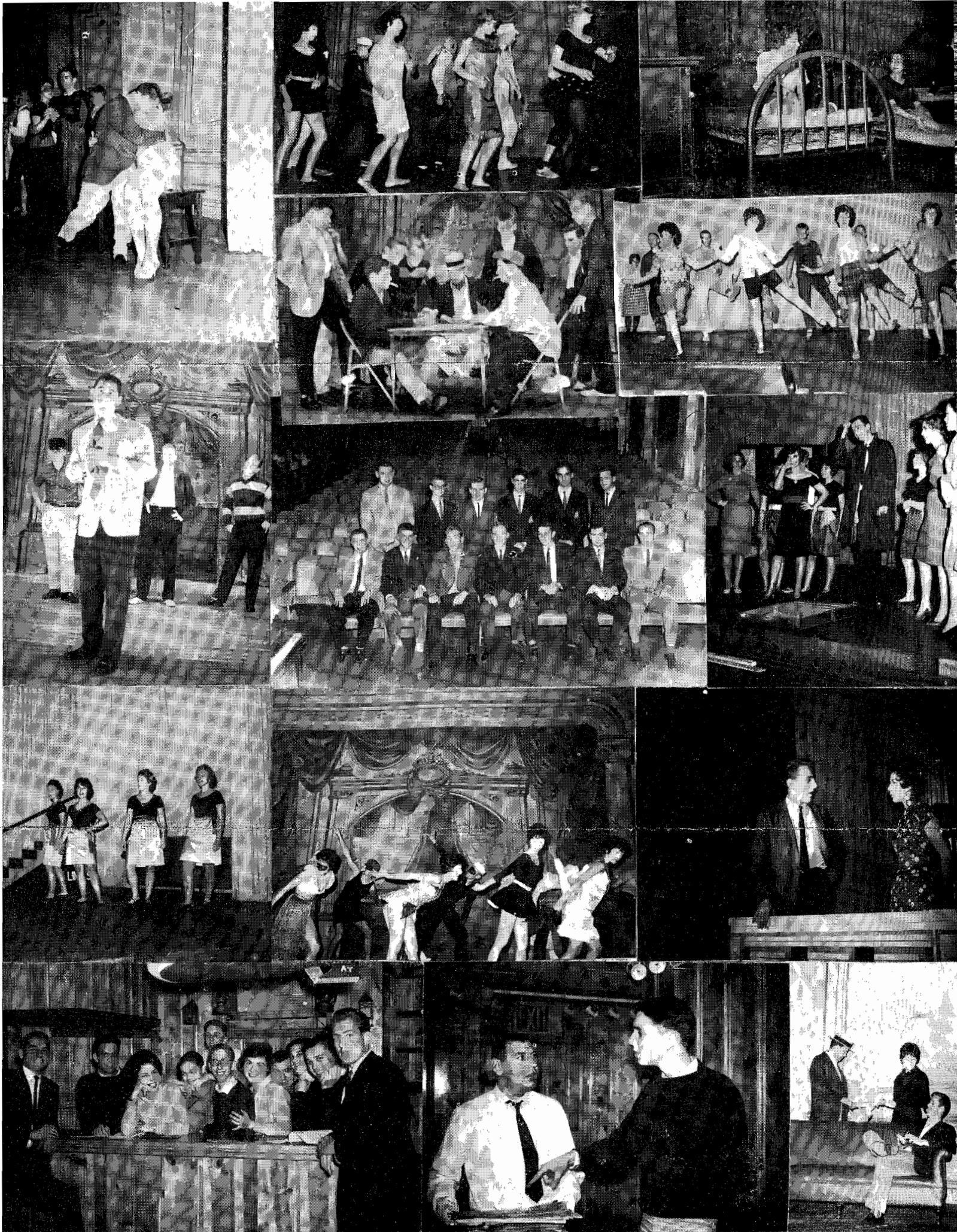
PI KAP ATHLETES

I remember last year's Orphan's Party and one little boy who took a fancy to jumping on Gene Bishop's bed.

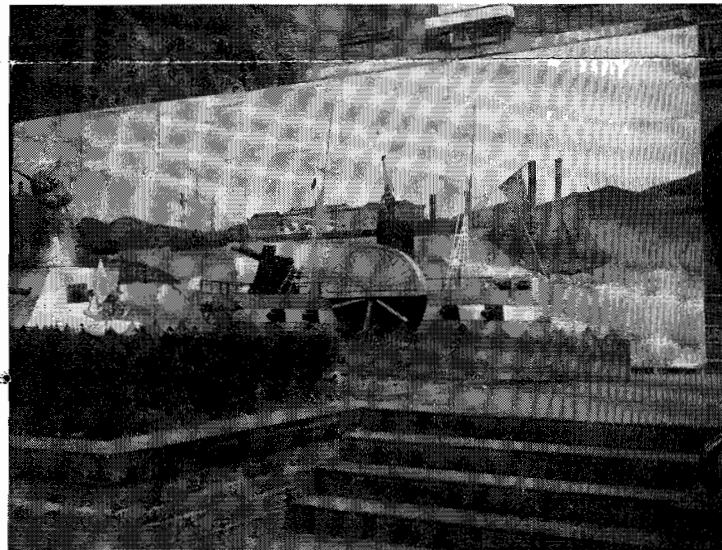
I remember also the Christmas formal at the House, the Pledge Party, Spring Weekend in the Poconos, and many other
