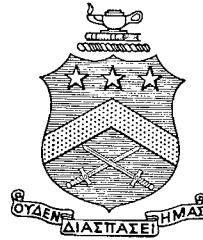

A Last Look

In the fall presentation of this publication, I took an opportunity to express my feelings concerning the passing of Brother John Deimler. It is said that one of the best measures of a man is the way he is remembered by those who were associated with him. In our fraternity, this measure comes from our brothers. Here are some of the comments received which I thought should be shared. Hopefully, no one will mind my repeating their remembrances of the past.

W. K. Sheppard, 725

Oscar (Hoke) Hokanson recalled being a waiter in the girls' dorm when John "Wilson Gashouse" Deimler was head waiter.

Henry (Hank) Coleman, Jr. recalled John was the same in the 30s when they were brothers and closely associated friends. He was a truly great man!

Jim Haislip, Jr. remembers rewiring the fraternity house on the corner and shoveling coal into that

lousy Iron Firemen. Lived at 3312 Powelton Avenue Row House down the block (our first house).

A letter from Harold Stiffler reflected these thoughts —

It is obvious that you had the privilege of working with John as he helped direct chapter activities just as many of us did. If anyone could be credited with single-handedly keeping Alpha Upsilon alive it would have to be John.

I was shocked to hear of his death and must have missed that national publication that would have summarized his activities if one of them did. Consequently, your article said so well the things that should have been said and I was glad to see it published.

If fraternities at Drexel went through the stages of deterioration that they did here at Western Illinois University in the last decade or so, John must have had an iron stomach and unshakeable faith to continue to give so generously of his time and talents. Although I have not supported Pi Kappa Phi to any great extent, the

few checks that I did send along were only because I thought that Deimler still had his eye on things. Each year I would debate whether it was wise to continue any support and then some of the chapter publications would cast further doubts with the rather immature ramblings of some of the officers' articles. Having experienced a few of Deimler's glances of disapproval for having partied it up a bit too much, I wondered how he reacted to what was going on now. I also wondered what the current actives must say when John tried to pound some sense into their heads.

Well, your article answered some of my questions if I read between the lines correctly. Things didn't always meet with his approval and he did speak up and he had a way about him that made the actives listen to him even though they might have done it just out of respect for the old guy.

You intimated that there were times when it must have taken guts for John to go to the chapter house. You pointed out that he knew how to have a good time and still keep the goals and ideals of the fraternity in mind.

He must have told the story many times about life at 3401 Powelton where our lease depended upon our behavior not offending the elderly maid of the elderly woman who lived at 3405. Also the phone calls about someone running around nude on the second floor.

I suppose a lot of people supported the fraternity because Deimler was in there fighting.

FROM THE DESK OF THE ARCHON

The 1981-82 school year has proven to be a successful one for the undergraduate chapter. Thanks to a very strong fall rush, we initiated 21 new brothers in the winter, with another 12 members presently in the spring pledge class. As the month of April winds down, the annual Pi Kapp Show is just winding up. This year's show will be on Friday, April 30 at 7:30 p.m. at the main auditorium and will benefit Children's Hospital and P.U.S.H. I need not stress how much this show means to the brotherhood and the

great participation and support needed for success. Also, scheduled for some time during the summer will be the annual alumni picnic. Stay tuned for more on that later. And lastly, for those who need long range advance warning, the annual parents-alumni day will be held on Sunday, November 21 at 2:00 p.m. Let's ALL try to make this the biggest and best reunion in some time. ALPHA UPSILON ALUMNI Corporation Meeting February 19, 1982

MINUTES — The meeting was called to order by President Fred Schmehl at 8:52 p.m. The minutes of the fall term meeting were read and approved as read.

Treasurer's report was distributed and explained.

A report on the apartment building report was distributed and explained.

No more on convention.

Chapter Advisor — Chapter at LaSalle will be chartered April 16-18, 1982. The chapter was started in September.

Undergraduate Chapter — Pledges will be initiated February 27. Twenty-two men are currently in the pledge class. The Pi Kapp Show will be April 30, alumni support is needed. The show benefits Childrens Hospital and the P.U.S.H. project.

Board of Directors — Fred Schmehl has written Carl Luff to determine status of his efforts to raise money from alumni who still have debts to the undergraduate chapter.

A letter will be issued in the next week regarding the Board of Directors position on undergraduate receivable goals as outlined in February Board of Directors meeting. The board has requested certain goals be obtained by the undergraduate chapter.

Electrical system in the undergraduate chapter house is in desperate need of repair. Sam Costa and Bob Imbrogno have secured three bids for the work necessary to correct electrical system. Bids ranged from \$16,500 to \$26,500 and varied in approach. Joe Santangelo will send bids to Harry and Ed Langschwager, alumni brothers who are both electrical contractors and lived in the house during the past decade and request their professional opinion. It was also noted that Brother B. Baldwin (185) was an electrical contractor and it was recommended he be contacted.

The Board of Directors has voted that the apartment house owned by them as an investment be considered for disposal. With a decrease in return

on investment and without an alumnus with the time to donate to replace John Deimler, its sale is considered the best investment strategy at this time. A committee has been created to pursue the sale with any and all prospective candidates.

50th Anniversary — May 20, 1983. Ed Hook and Bob Austin, who did such a commendable job on the 1981 convention, have volunteered to begin preliminary plans for our 50th anniversary.

Elections — The following officers have been elected to serve for one year: President - Fred Schmehl; Vice-President - Keith Sheppard; Secretary - Dave Parsons; Treasurer - Mike Varzally.

For a term of three years to expire 1986, the following brothers were elected to the Board of Directors: Jim Kelley, Joe Santangelo, Mike Lavelline.

For a term to expire 1983, the following brother was elected to fill a vacancy on the Board of Directors: Tim Bell.
